SUBJECT: Feedback regarding the "Can I Kiss You" Program

1. The 509th Bomb Wing Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) program welcomed Mr. Domitrz to Whiteman Air Force Base in September 2006, where he delivered three separate presentations of the "Can I Kiss You" program to an audience of Airmen in the high risk (18-24 year old) category. Over 900 of our young Airmen attended the presentations, and overall response to the presentation was overwhelmingly positive. I have attached a document containing a sampling of the comments we received.
2. I personally attended the program and found it to be both entertaining and enlightening. The message regarding consent, respect and communication were right in line with the Department of Defense SAPR program goals, and well received by our population.
3. This program was certainly a good return on our investment. Even though it has been several months since the presentation we still hear our Airmen talking about the message. I would definitely recommend this presentation to any military installation looking for a unique and entertaining way to address the issue of sexual assault.

He provided great scenarios that got people involved, which kept their attention on the subject he was there to teach about, it was AWESOME!! I thought the program was great and really kept his attention and the information that the speaker was giving out made you pay attention, it was probably his technique – Male, Senior Airman

A lot better than I anticipated, the speaker made it entertaining. – Male, Airman

I thought the speaker was great Ann, I really enjoyed the show. He seemed to put himself on their level of understanding.- Female, Master Sergeant

Speaker kept my full attention. Better than the normal briefing. Overall very interesting – Female, Airman First Class

I thought it was very interesting. It is a topic that not a lot of individuals like to talk about; he made it light and entertaining, and interactive – Female, Staff Sergeant

I really enjoyed what the speaker had to say. And he indirectly experienced sexual assault so he wasn't just up there blowing smoke and I respect that. I liked the examples he used to put sexual assault and rape into a different perspective. It was worth my time for sure and perhaps he should brief more often, too. – Female Senior Airman

I found it very funny, and not sugar coated. When people sugar coat things, it makes the subject boring. I enjoyed it and laughed quite a bit! – Male, Technical Sergeant

Well I attended the briefing, and at first I thought it would be very boring because I have had the Sexual Assault Awareness briefing so many times before, but actually it was very interesting to me because I didn't know it would be so exciting. This was the best Sexual Assault briefing I ever had. Male, Senior Airman

I thought that he was a very good speaker, and got all of our attention and all of us involved. – Female, Senior Airman

Hey, I think that was best SARC briefing I have had so far. He was very entertaining and made it a lot of fun. It was not a usual boring, do I have to sit here and hear this again kind of briefing. He actually kept everyone in the room awake. Male, Staff Sergeant

The troops I spoke with, both married and single, gave high marks on the presentation and the speaker as well. "Entertaining and informative"; can't get much better than that.
